Activity 1: My communities

What communities are you a part of? You may want to brainstorm as a class the different communities that pupils might be a member of (school, clubs, faith communities, ethnic groups, voluntary organisations, local communities, fans of a particular sports team).

Get children to produce a picture with themselves in the middle and the different communities that they are a part of around the outside.

Ask children to write what activities these communities do together. How do other people recognise members of that community (uniforms, badges, symbols)? What values or virtues do you think are particularly important for that community?

Activity 2: Being a community member

Discuss:

- What virtues do you need to be a good community member? Why?
- What would happen if members did not show these virtues?

Ask children to choose the three most important virtues that they think are needed and write a short explanation of why.

Plenary: Reflection

Choose one of the communities that you are part of. This week, how can you show some of the virtues that we need for good communities?
