	Activity 1: Special places	
	Using maps of your local area, ask children to identify the key places and features of your local community (e.g. parks,	
	shops, places of worship, housing).	
	In pairs, ask children to discuss which places in their local community they use or are particularly special to them. You may	
	want to ask children to create their own maps of their local area, with the places that are special to them.	



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Activity 2: People who serve the community

Use the community map to identify where people in the community provide a service (bus drivers, shop keepers, bin men, chefs, teachers etc.).

Ask children to choose one of the people mentioned and discuss the following questions:

- What do they do for their community?
- What skills do they use? What virtues?
- How do they help us?
- How can we help them?

You might ask children to produce a poster. Remind them that practising the habit of gratitude, to those who provide a service, helps us and our communities to flourish.
