Activity 2: Who is in your family?
Ask children to draw a picture of their family and answer the following questions:
<ul> <li>Who is in your family?</li> <li>What are they like?</li> <li>What do you enjoy doing together?</li> <li>Do you have any special family traditions, celebrations or routines?</li> <li>Are there specific virtues that are really important to your family?</li> </ul>
If they are comfortable, ask children to share their pictures with a partner.
Recap the discussion in the previous activity about showing respect to other people, and their families. Are there similarities/differences to their own families?
