
Saving for the Future

The quality of using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully

Inspirational People

David Attenborough (1926 – present day) Television presenter, Environmentalist



David Attenborough has been the face and voice of natural history programmes in Britain for more than 50 years. David is best known for writing and presenting the Life series on the BBC, and his 'Africa' series in 2013. Despite being in his eighties David is still working and passionate about wildlife.

Born in 1926, in Isleworth, West London, Attenborough always loved the natural world and spent his childhood collecting fossils, stones and other natural specimens. One of his adoptive sisters gave him a piece of amber filled with prehistoric creatures; some 50 years later, it would be the focus of his programme The Amber Time Machine.

Attenborough won a scholarship to Clare College, Cambridge in 1945, where he studied geology and zoology and obtained a degree in Natural Sciences. In 1950 he applied for a job as a Radio Talks producer with the BBC and in 1952 he joined the BBC full time. He's worked as a producer, controller, and presenter and has commissioned and produced many programmes focusing on everything from animal courtship displays, to elephants in Tanzania.

Attenborough has strong opinions on the dangers of climate change and of not taking care of the world for the future. His programmes have often included references to the impact of human society on the natural world. The last episode of The Living Planet, for example, focuses almost entirely on humans' destruction of the environment and the ways that it could be stopped or reversed.



His closing message from The State of the Planet was forthright:

"The future of life on earth depends on our ability to take action. Many individuals are doing what they can, but real success can only come if there's a change in our societies and our economics and in our politics. I've been lucky in my lifetime to see some of the greatest spectacles that the natural world has to offer. Surely we have a responsibility to leave for future generations a planet that is healthy, inhabitable by all species." – David Attenborough

Inspirational People

Lord Alan Sugar (1947 – present day) British Entrepreneur



Lord Alan Sugar is most famously known among the public for his role in the BBC television programme The Apprentice. However, to reach where he is today, he had to work very hard and plan for his future. Lord Sugar was born in Hackney, London. His family didn't have a lot of money and he was often bullied at school because his school uniform was homemade and his family couldn't afford a lavish bar mitzvah like his friends.

However, instead of becoming depressed, Lord Sugar worked hard and focused on his money making ventures. At the age of twelve, Lord Sugar woke at 6am every morning to boil beetroots for a local greengrocer. Over the years he did a milk and paper round, worked at a bakers and sold neighbours his home brewed ginger beer, saving money so he could eventually buy a van and use it to sell car aerials and electrical goods.

In 1968 Lord Sugar founded Amstrad. During the 1980s the company doubled its profits every year and soon Amstrad became one of the UK's leading consumer electronics companies. In 2007, BskyB bought Amstrad for about £125 million!

Lord Sugar now focuses on his other businesses, including his property portfolio in Mayfair in London, and his executive private jet company. In 2005 he began The Apprentice, a reality TV programme where aspiring business people compete in a variety of challenges to win a job working for him.

In 2009 he was named Enterprise Champion and appointed to the House of Lords as Baron Sugar of Clapton in the London Borough of



Hackney. He was awarded this title for his campaign that promoted the benefits of apprenticeships. In 2011 he was ranked 89th in the Sunday Times 2011 Rich List with an estimated wealth of £770 million.

Lord Sugar worked very hard to get where he is today. He overcame bullying at school by working hard and saving money for his future, and having faith that he would be successful. He focuses on helping others to do this, working with schools and businesses to promote apprenticeships to help young people in the UK enter into businesses and/or learn important skills without going to university.

"Back at home, lack of money was always the main item on the agenda. My parents did their best, but not being able to have what I wanted made me determined to do something for myself – to be selfsufficient." – Lord Alan Sugar

If you scored 20-27 you are a risk taker.

What Does it Mean? Important words

Character

is who you are. It is what makes you....you. It is what you believe in and how you act with others and when on your own. It is your values and your virtues.

Character trait

a feature of an individual or group of people, it tells you about their personality.

Virtue

a quality that is considered desirable in a person, all the good things about you that can be used to describe your character

The Eight Character Traits

Being determined the ability to keep going

whatever happens

Having a dream

having an aspiration, ambition or goal

Having courage

the ability to do the right thing even when it is difficult

Having patience

The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious.

Helping others

Make it easier or possible for someone to do something by offering them help

Saving for the future

the quality of using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully

Thinking creatively

the use of imagination or original ideas to create something new

Working together

the combined action of a group, especially when effective and efficient

Other Character Traits

Ambitious

a person with a strong desire to want to achieve something or reach a certain goal

Anxious

a person that is often worried that something may go wrong or not as planned

Charismatic

a character trait that includes traits such as leadership, charm and persuasiveness, an ability to inspire other people. You might often hear people say that a certain person is a charismatic leader; it means that people are naturally drawn to them, they are inspiring.

Compassionate

a person with the desire to help others

Delayed gratification

the ability of a person to wait for something that they want and not get it straight away

Doggedness

determined in effort, a very determined person

Endurance

finishing an unpleasant or difficult activity or process without giving up

Fortitude

being courageous or brave in the face of something difficult, painful or scary

Frugal

being very careful with your money, buying only things that are needed

Honesty

the ability to be truthful, sincere and fair

Humble

to feel that you are no more important than anyone else no matter what the situation, even you are the Queen or richest person in the world

Humility

the ability to be modest and respectful

Innovative

a person that starts something new, creates something or comes up with new ideas or ways to do something

Inspirational

making you feel hopeful or encouraged

Integrity

the possession of firm principles, for example if you are willing to do the right thing – even if nobody is watching

Optimistic

being positive and confident about what will happen

Prudent

acting with and showing care for the future, a person who is careful and sensible

Resilient

the ability to recover quickly from something, for example change, misfortune, illness

Risk averse

the dislike of, and desire, to avoid any type of risk

Sense of humour

the ability to face danger, difficulty, uncertainty and fear

Tenacious

a person that has an opinion in a determined way

Thrifty

a person that is careful with money, avoids waste **Tolerance** the ability to be able to accept difference

Will power

ability to control your own thoughts and how you behave

Academic

relating to school or higher education

Aspiration

a strong desire to achieve something

Audit

looking at previous records to see if they are correct

Credit card

a card issued by a bank for the purchase of items on credit – money that a person does not physically have but they are borrowing from a bank and will pay interest on (a percentage of extra money on top of what they are paying for an item)

Entrepreneur

a person who organises and works in a business, and takes on a financial (money) risk doing so.

Humiliation

to feel very embarrassed or ashamed

Mentor

a person who advises and guides people

Personal statement

a piece of writing about you to describe your character, what you are good at and your passion, normally to give to universities or potential employers.

Philanthropist

a person who makes charitable donations to help others, in time or money

Self-reflection

to think about yourself and reflect on who you are

Resources

an available supply that can

be drawn on when needed, for example a natural resource is a resource supplied by nature including water, wood and air. Vocational providing skills and education that prepare you for a job

Volunteer
