What are the possible consequences of people being dishonest online - both for the person being dishonest and the people they are communicating with?

What motivates people to be dishonest online?

What should you do if: You are the victim of cyberbullying? You witness cyberbullying? Your actions or words are cyberbullying someone else? You may want to divide children into groups to discuss the following questions. They could make some notes on A3 paper before feeding back to the class:

- Do you think it is easier or harder to tell when someone is being dishonest online? Why?
- Why is the virtue of honesty important online?
- What are the possible consequences of people being dishonest online both for the person being dishonest and the people they are communicating with?
- What motivates people to be dishonest online?

You may also want to look at the idea of social media presenting the 'best version' of ourselves and the possible impact on wellbeing that this may have.

## **Activity 2:** Cyber bullying

Some people may use the anonymity of the Internet to be unkind (you may want to look at trolling) or, in extreme cases, to bully other people.

- What are the differences between cyber bullying and bullying in person?
- What different forms could cyber bullying take?

What should you do if:

- You are the victim of cyberbullying?
- You witness cyberbullying?
- Your actions or words are cyberbullying someone else?
