Y8: Democracy L1 - What is democracy?	Learning objective: - Understand the meaning of democracy, parliament and the role of MP's and reflect on the virtues needed to be an MP.	Key vocabulary: Commons, House of Lords, constituency, general election, opposition, bill, cabinet, prime minister Key Virtues: Respect, participation, community awareness
Resources: PowerPoint presentations, resource sheet including – quiz and list of virtues	Statutory links: Citizenship guidance (2013) Pupils should be taught about: - The development of the political system of democratic government in the United Kingdom, including the roles of citizens, Parliament and the monarch; - the operation of Parliament, including voting and elections, and the role of political parties; - the precious liberties enjoyed by the citizens of the United Kingdom.	
Key questions: Who rules Britain? Has this always been the case? What was the case before democracy? Who rules in other countries?	Learning activities: Starter: "The first duty of a man is to think for himself" — Jose Marti "Elections belong to the people. It's their decision. Activity 2: Types of rule

Students look at the different types of leadership described in the table below.

- Which of the types of rule do you think is the best? Why?
- Are there any positives of the other styles?
- Can you think of any examples where you have seen these types of rule in the world?
- As somebody developing their character which of the styles of rule would allow you to flourish the most easily?

Anarchy	a situation where there is no government at all
Totalitarian state	a country where there is only one political party or one group of leaders, who have total power
Democracy	a system of government where representative leaders are chosen by election
Dictatorship	a system of government where one person or a small group rules, without having been chosen by the people



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Activity 3: What virtues does an MP need?

Students look at the Jubilee Centre list of virtues and identify suitable virtues for an MP.

- What does an MP do?
- What skills and virtues do you think you need to be a good MP?
- Which virtues do you think it is most important for MP's to possess?
- Are there any qualities that are missing?
- What are the most/least important qualities for MPs? Why?
- Could any of these virtues make it difficult to do the job well?

Activity 4: Why vote?

The video has introduced students to the concept of voting for an MP. Students discuss the following questions:

- How important do you think it is to vote? Why?
- What makes a good voter? Which virtues do you think they need?

Research shows that the younger people are when they first vote, the more likely they are to keep on doing it.

- Do you think the voting age should be lowered to 16? Why?

Plenary:

- How does the government and the work of MPs affect you as a young person?
- What impact does government have on your family?
